#### Introduction to Lent and Easter

Lent is a season of forty days beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending on Holy Saturday. It is a time of reflection, repentance and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. The period of forty days reflects the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness before he began his ministry. (The six Sundays during Lent are excluded from the 40 days) The colour for Lent is purple.

Easter Sunday is the day Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead The season of Easter lasts for 50 days (7 Sundays) until Pentecost. The colours of Easter are


Place a multi faceted sculpture on display on a table so that it can be viewed
















Pieces of blank paper with boxes on. Each time a child visits the area, they draw the object and write their name.

### Learning

#### DRAMA THAT'S NOT FAIR

That's not fair. (wave hands) That's not justice. (point a finger in the air)

They didn't like that he disagreed with them. They didn't like that he challenged what they did and what they taught. They didn't like that he said he was God's son. So they decided to get rid of him.

They bribed Judas, one of his friends, to betray him and tell them where he was.

Then they sent a gang in the middle of the night to arrest him.

They dragged him before a religious court, where he was beaten and where people told lies about him.

Then they took him before the Roman Governor, Pilate, and demanded that Jesus be sentenced to death.

#### That's not fair. That's not justice.

And even though Pilate decided that Jesus had done nothing wrong, and offered to execute a thief instead, the religious leaders stirred up the crowd, who shouted and shouted until Pilate agreed to put Jesus to death.

The Roman soldiers whipped Jesus and jammed a crown made out of thorns on his head. Then they laid a wooden beam on his back and marched him up a hill called The Skull.

#### That's not fair. That's not justice.

When they reached the top of the hill, they nailed the beam to another beam, to make the shape of a cross. Then they nailed Jesus' hands and feet to the cross and stood it upright, so everyone could watch him die.

#### That's not fair. That's not justice.

And while he was dying, the religious leaders laughed at Jesus and made fun of him. 'You saved other people,' they mocked. 'Why can't you save yourself?'

#### That's not fair. That's not justice.

Still he would not stop helping people. A thief on a cross next to him was sad and scared, so Jesus made him feel better. He made sure that his mum was taken care of. And he even asked God to forgive the people who had put him to death. And when he had suffered enough, Jesus closed his eyes and said 'It's finished.'

And the man who had done so much good for so many people died a criminal's death.

#### That's not fair. That's not justice.

But what did he mean? What was finished? Christians believe that he was talking about the work God sent him to do. Christians believe that his death was part of that plan. Christians believe that Jesus died to take the punishment for all the bad things anyone has ever done - so that we wouldn't have to be punished and be apart from God forever. Christians believe Jesus chose to die - to die for all of us.

In Good Friday Christians remember that what happened to Jesus was not fair or just.


esus was not a criminal, he was God's precious Son.

Amen.




