"It's amazing," said Ant Trainer, coach for the club. "We have all worked really hard for this and I'm so proud of my team."

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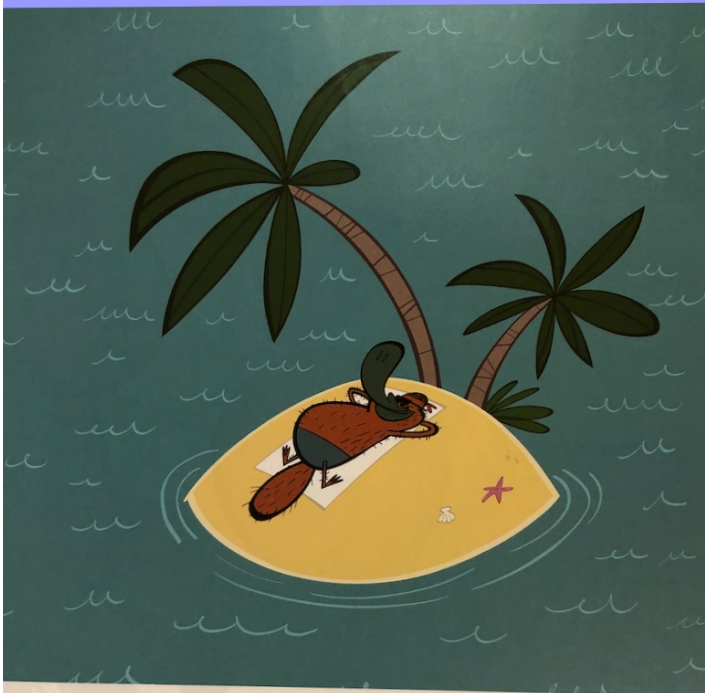



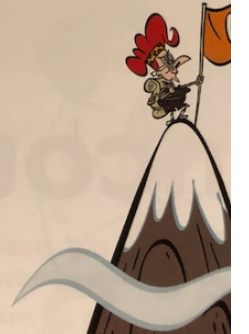
