Fruits from the Roots













Make a display of a racetrack. Children write or draw a picture on a small piece of paper of themselves practising a skill that needs perseverance. (This could be an educational or personal target.)


<u>Engage</u>

Today we're going to look at a painting by a French artist, James Tissot. It shows some refugees with a young child.

Who do you think the artist is depicting in this picture? What makes you think this?

The painting is called 'The Flight into Egypt'.

We are now going to hear the part of the story from the Bible which was the inspiration for James Tissot's painting. Ask a child to read.

An angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph and said, "Herod will be looking for the child in order to kill him. So get up, take Jesus and his mother and escape to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you to leave."

Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and left during the night for Egypt, where he stayed until Herod died. Matthew 2.13-15

Mary and Joseph must have felt afraid and scared about what the future might hold as they travelled to start a new life in a strange land. It was a very long way to travel and yet they knew that this was a journey they had to make.

They had to persevere in their quest to escape from King Herod and keep their small child safe.

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People become refugees when they are forced to leave or escape from their home due to circumstances they can't control or being in danger, just like Mary and Joseph in this story.

Reflecting

Being made a refugee is not something that belongs just to the past. Every day people are forced from their homes because they are in danger of losing their lives if they stay.

This is the account written by a young girl who fled from Burundi at a time when war made her country a very dangerous place to live.

It is hard when you have to leave everything behind you, not only your belongings, but also your family, friends and country. Your journey seems to be difficult and to have no end. You are torn up, and you think that you will be difficult and to have no end. You are torn up, and you were before. You have to never smile again, or you will never be happy as you were before. You have to never smile again, or you will never be happy as you want to cry and hope for a better accept the way life is, and sometimes you want to cry and hope for a better day, but it is not always the case.

To leave everything behind you, to leave not because you want to, because it is your decision, but because it is not safe, and war does not give you that choice. War decides for you, and has no mercy on you. For me the war is there to destroy peace and love, to separate children from their war is there to destroy peace and love, to separate children from their parents, and to live always in fear. One has to live with a scar, which often

And your journey doesn't finish in your refuge or asylum. It continues because you have to learn to accept what happened to you, and to realize that the nightmare is so far from the happy dream that you wish to have every night. Dreams are broken. You feel so sad and alone that any moment every night would be accepted the property of joy can make you feel guilty because you think you do not deserve it, and you are not worthy of it.

But step by step you learn one lesson, and that keeps you going. You have to live and persevere because tomorrow could be better.

Jesus and his parents, Mary and Joseph, were refugees 2000 years ago, but there are still millions of refugees escaping from dangerous places in the world today. Some flee to this country. They have come searching for safety and a new start. They hope with all their hearts that they will find a welcome.
